UNDER CONSTRUCTION... Parking lots and Film Festivals

Throughout the fall and winter I have been gazing at — listening to — the sights and sounds of the major construction project literally right outside my office door. The inevitable comparisons arise between constructing a building complex and building a film festival.

Parking lot transformations require developers, architects, contractors and lots of "guys" in hard hats. Film festivals need staff, volunteers, film aficionados and donors armed with strong will, creativity, perseverance and sometimes **hard heads**.

The early stages of our building project included large noisy machines and some serious digging. Preliminary efforts for the 8th Annual Festival included a significant web site overhaul and Wiki project chronicling the seven years of the Fargo Film Festival.

In late fall, as the snow began to fly, concrete flowed into the excavated parking lot and film submissions piled up in the theatre. In January and February, construction workers donned layers of heavy clothing and began framing the basement level of their project. Fargo Film Festival volunteers and staff began framing our project in the basement of the theatre with hours of film viewing, critiquing and selecting.

Fargo Film Festival 08 is ready to roll! The parking lot construction project that includes our long anticipated second screen will make its debut in about a year – just in time for FFF09.

My heartfelt thanks to the hardworking 2008 Festival construction workers who have carefully crafted a four and a half day festival that is certain to entertain, engage, delight and amaze.



Despite their success over the years, owners Ed and Vern Savko have not been without their share of adversity, yet through it all they've remained dedicated to the ideals they established for their business nearly fifty years ago. Through their devotion, the Rock Store has become nothing short of an icon, earning its place among the artifacts of Americana.

TED LARSON (1940-2000) is best known for his presentations of classical film, seminars and movie series events at colleges, theatres and arts centers throughout the region. He was named Distinguished Alumnus of Minnesota State University Moorhead (MSUM) in 1998 for contributions to students and film studies.

A Glyndon, Minnesota native, Larson graduated from MSUM in 1962 with speech/theatre and English degrees and taught at Benjamin Franklin Junior High School in Fargo for six years. He then joined the speech and theatre arts faculty at MSUM, where he taught for 32 years. He directed MSUM's International Film Festival and Summer Cinema Film Series for more than 20 years. He also held a master's degree in speech and drama from the University of Kansas.

A long-time member of the Fargo Theatre's board of directors, he was one of the initiators and co-producers of its Silent Movie Night, which began in 1974. He also collaborated with symphonies in Butte and Billings, Montana, as a guest scholar. Most recently, and up until his death, Ted influenced planning for the first Fargo Film Festival.

THE FARGO FILM FESTIVAL HONORS THE LIFE AND WORK OF

Rusty Casselton

HAROLD "RUSTY" CASSELTON, chair of the Film Studies Department at Minnesota State University Moorhead and one of the Fargo-Moorhead area's most respected film historians, died December 30, 2007 at the age of 53. A tremendous supporter of the movies, especially the silent cinema, Rusty was known around the world for his efforts in film restoration and preservation. Rusty collaborated with mentor Ted Larson for many years, and their efforts resulted in a variety of wonderful opportunities for movie fans, who regularly attended popular events like Silent Movie Night at the Fargo Theatre and the Summer Cinema series on the campus of MSUM.

THE FARGO FILM FESTIVAL HONORS THE LIFE AND WORK OF

Ted M.Larson

Through his work in locating, restoring and reconstructing lost and rare films, Ted and his longtime collaborator and friend, Rusty Casselton, have made donations of valuable motion pictures to The Library of Congress, The George Eastman House, The UCLA film and Television Archive and The Museum of Modern Art. Until his death he also administered the Colleen Moore Film Grant program at MSUM, which funds projects for student filmmakers. He and Rusty have also provided Kevin Brownlow, British film documentarian, with rare film footage for his television productions *Universal Horror* and *Lon Chaney*.

Among his many achievements, Larson has helped a number of talented young filmmakers develop careers. His former students have worked with the likes of Steven Speilberg, David Letterman and George Lucas.


Ted was a unique presence who impacted constituencies, institutions and audiences throughout the United States. We are deeply saddened by his death and acutely aware that Ted Larson is indeed irreplaceable.



Additionally, Rusty participated in the Fargo Film Festival from the time of its inception, often providing a small army of students to help staff and run the various second venue locations as volunteers. His many relationships to film industry professionals also resulted in frequent festival submissions. A dedicated educator, Rusty taught film studies courses at Concordia College for 22 years before accepting a position at MSUM in 2001. He will be greatly missed by the Fargo Film Festival, his students, his extended family, his friends, his colleagues, and his wife Cindy and daughters Hannah and Amanda.
