Thankfully it is our technology, not our imaginations that have been streamlined. These innovations have given filmmakers around the world the ability to dream bigger, reach further, and speak louder. This astonishing progress can bring the voices of the world to Fargo for one incredible week every March.

To me, movies will always be enormous things. They are our stories: our heroes, our fears, our legends, laughs, and lessons. That is a pretty grand thing after all... even if they seem to only exist as such an intangible thing as a Vimeo link.

On behalf of the entire team, it is my pleasure to welcome you to the 13th annual Fargo Film Festival. It is our most sincere wish that you see something this week that makes the world seem a little smaller and the dreams of the world a little larger.







TED M. LARSON AWARD Hal Hartley

HAL HARTLEY was born in 1959 in Lindenhurst. New York, on Long Island. Hartley has written and directed twelve feature films since his acclaimed 1989 debut, The Unbelievable Truth. He has been lauded as a singular talent in the American independent film sector, collecting numerous awards. His work has been showcased at film festivals such as Sundance, Cannes, Berlin, Toronto, Rotterdam, Melbourne, Sydney, and countless others. He has also worked extensively in the performing arts, directing opera and theatre productions in the United States and Europe. Renowned for his articulate, sharp, often satirical, but always compassionate scripts, Hartley's work combines the best of American-style exuberance and intelligence with broader artistic influences from Europe and Asia. His work has been favorably compared to the films of Hollywood comedic master Preston Sturges, to the searching and formally inventive films of French New Wave legend Jean-Luc Godard, and to the kinetic, balletic solemnity of Buster Keaton movies. In the two and a half decades since his arrival on the independent film scene, Hal Hartley has emerged as one of the most impressive and idiosyncratic American film artists, as an astute, witty observer of contemporary society, all while illuminating the subtle

and seismic shifts in American sensibilities in an increasingly globalized world. (Tom McSorley, Executive Director, Canadian Film Institute)

TED LARSON (1940-2000) is best known for his presentations of classical film, seminars and movie series events at colleges, theatres and arts centers throughout the region. In 1998 he was named Distinguished Alumnus of Minnesota State University Moorhead, where he taught for 32 years. Ted directed MSUM's International Film Festival and Summer Cinema Film Series for more than 20 years. A long-time member of the Fargo Theatre's board of directors, Ted influenced planning for the first Fargo Film Festival.



Through his work in locating, restoring and reconstructing lost and rare films, Ted and his longtime collaborator and friend, Rusty Casselton, have made donations of valuable motion pictures to The Library of Congress, The George Eastman House, The UCLA film and Television Archive and The Museum of Modern Art. Until his death he also administered the Colleen Moore Film Grant program at MSUM, which funds projects for student filmmakers. Ted was a unique presence who impacted constituencies, institutions and audiences.

Ramaa Mosley, Director

Ramaa Mosley made her first film at age sixteen, the documentary We Can Make a Difference, about global pollution's effect on children. The doc was screened around the world and went on to win a United Nations' Global 500 Award in Geneva, Switzerland. That same year, Mosley enrolled at Bennington College in Vermont, where she studied theater, literature and photography.

Upon graduating, Mosley was hired by the Dutch government to direct a documentary on the Aymara Indians of Bolivia. Within months, Mosley had seven offers to sign as a director with the top commercial companies and soon was directing music videos for bands such as B-52s, Brendan Benson, Creed and Five for Fighting.

Mosley has since been directing award-winning national and international commercials for clients such as Adidas, Powerade, PGA, Pedigree, Walmart and ESPN.

Mosley won best director at the First Glance Film Festival for her short film Grace. In 2011 she won the Audience Choice Award at Dance Camera West for her film In Dreams I Run Wild. 
Kirk has multiple projects in development, including one that plans on shooting in Louisiana, *Untitled* (TBA), and a film this summer entitled *Pain Killers*.






Eric Hayden,
