



#### **Monkey Rag**

(4m) Directed by Joanna Davidovich, Atlanta, GA Inspired by the thumping, riotously fun music of the Asylum Street Spankers, this traditionally animated film is a throwback to the musical cartoons of yore.

#### Pareidolia

(7m) Directed by Maya Erdelyi, Los Angeles, CA Through a re-imagining of family stories and life events, the filmmaker connects the profound experience of witnessing public cremations in India to her great-grandmother's miraculous survival of a mass killing by Hungarian Nazis along the banks of the Danube in 1944.

#### Shelved

(6m) Directed by James Cunningham, Auckland, New Zealand Even robots get bored in dead end jobs, until they realize they are about to be replaced by humans!

#### Wise Choice or Lucky Guess

(4m) Directed by Ellen Raines, Fox Point, WI A recently deceased man has to make his own choice between heaven and hell, while sitting on an escalator.

Documentary Feature Winners

#### Bending Steel • Winner: The Bill Snyder Award for Best Documentary Feature



(93m) Directed by Dave Carroll, New York, NY This intimate journey explores the lost art of the oldetime strongman and one man's struggle to overcome limitations of body and mind.

#### **American Heart • Honorable Mention**

WINNER

(92m) Directed by Chris Newberry, Wayzata, MN A primary care clinic in Minnesota becomes a crossroads for embattled refugees and their devoted doctors. We get a glimpse of the failing health and remarkable lives of Lem Thor, a former political prisoner from Cambodia; Patrick Junior, a member of an oppressed ethnic minority in Burma; and Alex Gliptis, an Ethiopian refugee suffering from PTSD, diabetes and HIV.



#### Brave Miss World • Winner: Ruth Landfield Award

(90m) Directed by Cecilia Peck, Santa Monica, CA Miss Israel Linor Abargil was abducted, stabbed, and raped at age 18. Only six weeks after the horrific attack, Linor represented her country in the Miss World competition and won the crown. Ten years later, convinced she is healed, Linor decides to confront her past and reach out to other survivors.

#### The Buffalo King • Winner: Prairie Spirit Award



(60m) Directed by Justin Koehler, Centennial, CO – This inspiring tale follows James (Scotty) Philip from his meager upbringing to his success in saving the American bison from extinction.

#### The Fabulous Ice Age

(72m) Directed by Keri Pickett, Minneapolis, MN The Fabulous Ice Age chronicles a century of theatrical skating, from Berlin's Charlotte in 1915, to the American Ice Capades. The film illustrates how ice dancing dominated live entertainment for decades, while also depicting one skater's passionate quest to share this history.

#### A Fragile Trust: Plagiarism, Power, and Jayson Blair at the New York Times

(77m) Directed by Samantha Grant, San Francisco, CA In 2003, Jayson Blair became the most infamous serial plagiarist of our time when a massive scandal rocked the *New York Times* and the entire world of journalism.

#### Half the Road: The Passion, Pitfalls and Power of Women's Professional Cycling

(111m) Directed by Kathryn Bertine, Tucson, AZ – With footage from some of the world's best races to interviews with Olympians, world champs, and even the U.S. Surgeon General, *Half the Road* offers a unique insight into what it takes for a female cyclist to thrive in a male-dominated sport.

#### If We Shout Loud Enough

(98m) Directed by Gabe DeLoach, Crozet, AL – Meet Nolen, a singer who stutters uncontrollably until he picks up the microphone; Bruce, a bassist who can make his battered instrument sound like an entire rock band; Denny, whose drum set regularly collapses under the force of his pummeling; and dozens of the fans, musicians, and artists who have catalyzed Baltimore's underground music scene.

#### A Life Outside

(83m) Directed by Catherine Brabec, New York, NY – After more than 50 years of riding the waves at Casion Pier in Seaside Heights, NJ, six surfers face the devastation of Hurricane Sandy. These incredible men embody passion, obsession and a desire to live a life connected to nature.

#### **Meeting Charlie Parr**

(59m) Directed by Francois-Xavier Dubois, Paris, France This musical journey through the Midwest captures the life and work of folk singer Charlie Parr.

#### The River's Divide

(47m) Directed by Kyle Nickolite, River Falls, WI

Bow hunter Donnie Vincent embarks on an epic journey in to the Badlands of North Dakota chasing a notorious whitetail deer known only as 'Steve'.

Documentary Short Winners

Framing the Other • Winner: Best Documentary Short and Mary John Award (25m) Directed by Ilja Kok and Willem Timmers, Harderwijk, Netherlands Every year hundreds of Western tourists flock to Ethiopia to see the unusually adorned members of the Mursi tribe. A tourist's comfortable attitude toward photographing "exotic" indigenous people is shaken after an encounter with a Mursi woman.

#### congratulations to Framing the Other Directed by Ilja Kok and Willem Timmers

Mary John, Dakota/Hidatsa, is an enrolled member of Spirit Lake Nation. She is the independent associate producer of *The Good Life*, a documentary on White Earth wild rice season, director/ producer/narrator for *All My Relatives*, an oral history documentary of Spirit Lake Nation, Best Feature Film, 2002 Fargo Film Festival, National Elder Hero Award, 2008, City of Fargo Recognition Award, 2009. Mary has a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Moorhead State University and has served as president of Daughters of the Earth, a local native women non-profit organization.

#### **Duk County • Honorable Mention**



(36m) Directed by Jordan Campbell, Lafayette, CO This moving story follows a bold, five-day mission to deliver eye-care in a remote and war-torn region of South Sudan. The film chronicles the miraculous work of Dr. Geoff Tabin and Dr. Alan Crandall, eye surgeons committed to eradicating preventable blindness in Africa, and John Dau, one of the original Lost Boys of Sudan and a visionary for peace in South Sudan.



#### **Call Me Ehsaan**

(9m) Directed by Micah Garen, New York, NY – This haunting look at the US war in Afghanistan is seen through the eyes of Lt. Col. JD Loftis, one of only three Pashto-speaking US Airforce officers, who was killed in February while working at the Ministry of Interior in Kabul.

#### **Cardboard Titanics**

(10m) Directed by Sam Frazier, Jr., Birmingham, AL – Delusional people build, row, and race boats made solely of cardboard and duct tape in an insane effort to recapture the American dream.

#### A Good Wife

(18m) Directed by Linda Brieda, New York, NY – In a hidden corner of rural India, women struggle against a conservative, patriarchal society. In this film the women reveal their diminished role in arranged marriages, often challenged by demands for dowry or faced with domestic violence. Despite all their challenges, they try to be what society calls a good wife.

#### Haenyeo: Women of the Sea

(12m) Directed by Alex Igidbashian, Daye Jeong, and Kevin Sawicki, Atlantic Highlands, NJ – For centuries female free-divers of Jeju Island, South Korea have collected sea food without the use of scuba equipment. Eighty-two year old diver Chuwar Park shares her daily routine, reflects on her past, and sheds light on this unique matriarchal culture.

#### Herd in Iceland

#### (28m) Directed by Lindsay Blatt, New York, NY

For over 1,000 years, Icelandic law has made it illegal to import horses onto the island. Icelandic horses are a pure breed, isolated by oceanic borders. During the summer months, the horses live a remote and wild existence, grazing in the highlands and raising their young. Every September they're rounded up by local farmers and directed across the rugged terrain to reunite with their owners.

(38m) Directed by Sara Peak Convery, Chicago, IL – Happiness doesn't always make a good story. Before and after the death of her father, Sara Peak Convery (filmmaker and artist) obsessively examines her parents' conflicted relationship through the lens of her own paintings, family photography, and revealing interviews.

#### Life Changing Moments

(18m) Directed by Sherry Thomas, Valley Village, CA Filmmaker and surgeon Dr. Sherry Thomas travels to Africa to provide free surgery and medical care to dozens of impoverished African women suffering with fistula.

#### The No Name Painting Association

(23m) Directed by Joe Griffin, Los Angeles, CA Thirteen young artists defy Mao's regime during China's Cultural Revolution.

#### The Pier

(20m) Directed by Chris Abernathy, Los Angeles, CA Four street performers experience struggles and triumphs over a winter weekend on the iconic Santa Monica Pier.

#### Sweet Crude Man Camp

(11m) Directed by Isaac Gale, Minneapolis, MN This documentary takes a stark and haunting look at the realities created by the ongoing oil boom in the Bakken region of North Dakota.

#### There She Is

(20m) Directed by Veena Rao and Emily Sheskin, New York, NY In many ways, best friends Allison Kopach and Jenny Flores are typical pageant queens. They love makeup, fashion, and anything that sparkles. At size 22, however opportunities in the pageant world are limited. We follow these women as they prepare for and compete in the 2011 American Beauties Plus Pageant.

# Experimental Film Winners

#### F-Line • Winner: Best Experimental Film (9m) Directed by Silvia Turchin, Berkeley, CA



This sensory-based poetic documentary explores the ethereal past of San Francisco's historic streetcars. Shot entirely on celluloid, F-Line embodies a textural way of perceiving these relics and examines the traces of time's mystery that fluctuate beneath the surface. By temporarily lifting the veil of the present, the film enables the viewer to experience the latent world of personal memory in public place.

#### **Virtuos Virtuell • Honorable Mention**



(7m) Directed by Maja Oschmann and Thomas Stellmach, Kassel, Germany – Synchronized to music, abstract ink drawings 'grow' in an interplay of curiosity, timid encounters, dynamic pursuits and confrontation. This stimulates many emotions and carries us off on a poetical journey to a musical world of pictures.

# Experimental Film Official Selections

#### Antennas to Beyond

(5m) Directed by Ryan Ohm, Elmhurst, IL – When a boy wakes up under a massive electric tower unsure of how he got there, he finds out through visual flashbacks and experimentation that his brain had been catching strange signals from an unknown source.

#### **Black Sea of Trees**

(13m) Directed by Marc Forand, Toronto, Canada - Set to the Northumbria song with the same title, this time-lapse film was influenced by the mythology of the Aokigahara, Japan's haunted forest of death.

#### Crops

(4m) Directed by Gerco de Ruijter, Rotterdam, Netherlands Center Pivot Irrigation is widely used throughout the United States. In this visual experience we see the mark man leaves on our tiny planet.

#### **Postface**

(7m) Directed by Dana Levy, Chicago, IL – In a celebrity-obsessed culture, filmmakers often exploit the downfall of a star to amplify the emotional undertones of the fictional films in which they perform. Postface takes a look back at the filmography of Montgomery Clift, whose private life and career spiral downward after a 1956 car crash that left his face scarred and partially paralyzed.







(10m) Directed by Jack Cronin, Ann Arbor, MI Filmed along the Huron River and Mallets Creek in Michigan, images of light and moving water are incorporated with images of the filmmaker's children.

#### Sightings

(4m) Directed by Kent Tate, Southwest, Canada The filmmaker explores his world as it often appears today, a world quite different from what he anticipated as a child.

#### **Two Seconds After the Laughter**

(16m) Directed by David Rousseve, Sherman Oaks, CA An original intersection of documentary, dance-for-camera, and dream-like fantasy, *Two Seconds After the Laughter* creates a border-jumping dialogue on a universal irony: the heart longs most for the one place to which it can never fully return... home.

#### Wrest

(5m) Directed by Kent Lambert, Chicago, IL – Footage deposited in the Chicago Film Archives is reimagined into a psychedelic dream narrative of collapsed ambition and subliminal desire.

#### 3 Mile Limit • Winner: Best Narrative Feature



(105m) Directed by Craig Newland, Okura, New Zealand Based on a true story. It's 1965 and rock music is shaking up the world... but not in New Zealand. Richard Davis is determined to break the government's monopoly on broadcasting and bring rock n' roll to the younger generation.

#### **Putzel • Honorable Mention**



(88m) Directed by Jason Chaet, New York, NY

Walter Himmelstein is heir to a famous Manhattan smoked fish emporium. He grew up in the family store and is content to live the rest of his life without ever leaving his Upper West Side neighborhood. Until he meets Sally, a girl from out of town...

#### **The Retrieval** • Honorable Mention (94m) Directed by Chris Eska, Gonzales, TX



On the outskirts of the U.S. Civil War, a boy is sent north by his bounty hunter gang to retrieve a wanted man.

#### **Dust of War**

(92m) Directed by Andrew Kightlinger, Pierre, SD In a post-apocalyptic American frontier, a soldier fends off a brutal warmonger to rescue a girl fated as the savior of humanity.

#### Forev

(88m) Directed by Molly Green and James Leffler,

West Hollywood, CA – Sophie and Pete get engaged on their first date, which is a 6-hour drive through the desert. And then nothing goes wrong... nothing at all.

#### **Hide Your Smiling Faces**

(80m) Directed by Daniel Carbone, New York, NY After a neighborhood tragedy, two adolescent brothers confront changing relationships, the mystery of nature, and their own mortality.

#### The Little Tin Man

(84m) Directed by Matthew Perkins, New York, NY Tired of being overlooked for bigger roles, a struggling dwarf actor sets out to be cast as the Tin Man in Martin Scorsese's remake of *The Wizard of Oz*.

#### **Mad Ship**

(94m) Directed by David Mortin, Caledon, Canada Toman Sorensen, a Norwegian immigrant to Western Canada in the 1920s, dreams of establishing a family wheat dynasty. The perfect storm of prairie drought and the economic crash of 1929 delivers his family to the precipice of ruin. When his beautiful wife Solveig dies, he vows to return her body to her homeland and embarks on a quixotic mission to build a ship and sail out of the prairie dust bowl.

#### Towheads

(85m) Directed by Shannon Plumb, New York, NY – Adventurous and bold mother of two Penelope struggles to strike the balance between her artistic aspirations and motherly responsibilities.

#### Tu seras un homme

(87m) Directed by Benoit Cohen, Paris, France – Leo is 10 and wise beyond his years, a solitary dreamer who seeks refuge in books. When the carefree 20-year-old Theo steps into his life, Leo begins to break out of his shell. Despite disapproval from Leo's family, the two becomes best friends, helping each other face up to their responsibilities.



HAROLD "RUSTY" CASSELTON was known around the world for his contributions to

film restoration and preservation. Rusty collaborated with mentor Ted Larson for many years, and their efforts resulted in a variety of wonderful opportunities for movie fans, who regularly attended popular events like Silent Movie Night at the Fargo Theatre and the Summer Cinema series on the campus of MSUM.

At the time of his passing, Rusty was chair of the Film Studies Department at Minnesota State University Moorhead.

He participated in the Fargo Film Festival from the time of its inception, providing a small army of students to help staff and run the various second venue locations as volunteers. A dedicated educator, Rusty taught film studies courses at Concordia College for 22 years before accepting a position at MSUM in 2001. He is greatly missed by the Fargo Film Festival, his students, his extended family, his friends, his colleagues, his wife Cindy and daughters Hannah and Amanda.

# the fargo film festival Jed M. Larson



TED LARSON (1940-2000) was best known for his presentations of classical film,

seminars and movie series events at colleges, theatres and arts centers throughout the region.

In 1998 he was named Distinguished Alumnus of Minnesota State University Moorhead, where he taught for 32 years. Ted directed MSUM's International Film Festival and Summer Cinema Film Series for more than 20 years.

A longtime member of the Fargo Theatre's board of directors, Ted influenced planning for the first Fargo Film Festival.

Through his work in locating, restoring and reconstructing lost and rare films, Ted and his longtime collaborator and friend Rusty Casselton made donations of valuable motion pictures to The Library of Congress, The George Eastman House, The UCLA Film and Television Archive and The Museum of Modern Art. Until his death he also administered the Colleen Moore Film Grant program at MSUM, which funds projects for student filmmakers. Ted was a unique presence who impacted constituencies, institutions and audiences.

**ART PHILLIPS** is the General Manager/Director of Video Arts Studios, a full service creative communications and production facility with offices and studios in Fargo, North Dakota. He was one of the original founders of the Fargo Film Festival in 2001 and served on the Fargo Theatre Board of Directors. He also served on the North Dakota Film Commission. His love of film and music is apparent in his work as a director/producer over the past 35 years.

Art has won numerous awards in the director's chair including honors from Houston International Film Festival, Telly Awards, American Advertising Federation and the New York Film Festival. He was a Best Director Finalist at the International Teleproduction Society Monitor Awards. Art was also presented the Silver Medal Award by the American Advertising Federation of North Dakota.


